Introduction

- Today's event marks the opening of Ngā Hau Māngere, an incredible new transport connection and community space across the Manukau Harbour.
- Despite the challenges of COVID on our shores these past few years, this is the
 second opening of a significant piece of walking and cycling infrastructure in Auckland
 these past few months, following the opening in May of the longest section of Glen
 Innes to Tāmaki which is now being enjoyed by people travelling on foot or wheels.
- It is great that we are able to come together to celebrate the new bridge and the positive change this project will deliver to local communities.
- While the Government Policy Statement on land transport (GPS) sets out how money from the National Land Transport Fund is allocated towards achieving the

Government's transport priorities, it also talks about how the purpose of the transport system is to improve people's wellbeing, and the liveability of places.

- The transport system improves people's wellbeing by contributing to five key outcomes Inclusive access (to economic opportunities such as work and education), healthy and safe people (protecting people from transport related injuries and harmful pollution), environmental sustainability (transitioning to net zero carbon emissions), resilience and security (minimising and managing risks) and economic prosperity (supporting economic activity with efficient movement of people and products)
- Ngā Hau Māngere aligns perfectly with these outcomes.
- Although delivered by Waka Kotahi, the additional community and environmental benefits this project delivers have been enhanced thanks to our partnership with mana whenua and our engagement throughout with the community.
- I would like to acknowledge how incredibly important this partnership is to Waka Kotahi and I know that this sentiment is one which the team working on this project agree.
- Many of us here are familiar with the Old Mangere Bridge which stood in the Manukau
 Harbour since 1915 and are aware of how much it was cherished by the community.
 When the bridge closed in 2018 due to safety concerns, we saw the outpouring of love which people had for it.
- At the time, Waka Kotahi undertook work to ensure that the community were provided
 a safe and appealing alternative route via the nearby SH20 underpass while Ngā Hau
 Māngere was constructed to ensure that a walking and cycling connection across the
 harbour could remain until we were able to be here today for the official opening of
 this new bridge.
- Today as we celebrate the opening of this new bridge for the community and I look forward to it becoming a place where both current and future generations create memories with their whānau and friends.

- Without further ado I would like to call on the <u>Minister of Transport Hon Michael</u>
 <u>Wood to share a few words.</u>
- Thank you, Minister for sharing your views on the importance of helping support Aotearoa move to a low carbon emissions transport system.
- I'd now like to introduce the Mayor of Auckland Phil Goff.
- Thank you, Mayor Goff for sharing your insights.
- I'd now like to invite <u>Councillor Alf Filipaina</u>, <u>Manukau Ward Councillor</u>.
- Thank you, Alf for acknowledging all those who have been involvement in the project over many years and those not able to be here with us today.
- I'd now like to invite <u>Mark Kinvig, Waka Kotahi National Manager Infrastructure</u>
 Delivery.
- Thank you, Mark for acknowledging the important role the community has played.

Instruction for ribbon cutting and regatta

 Ama regatta. The flag is to be held up for approx. 1 minute before being dropped.
