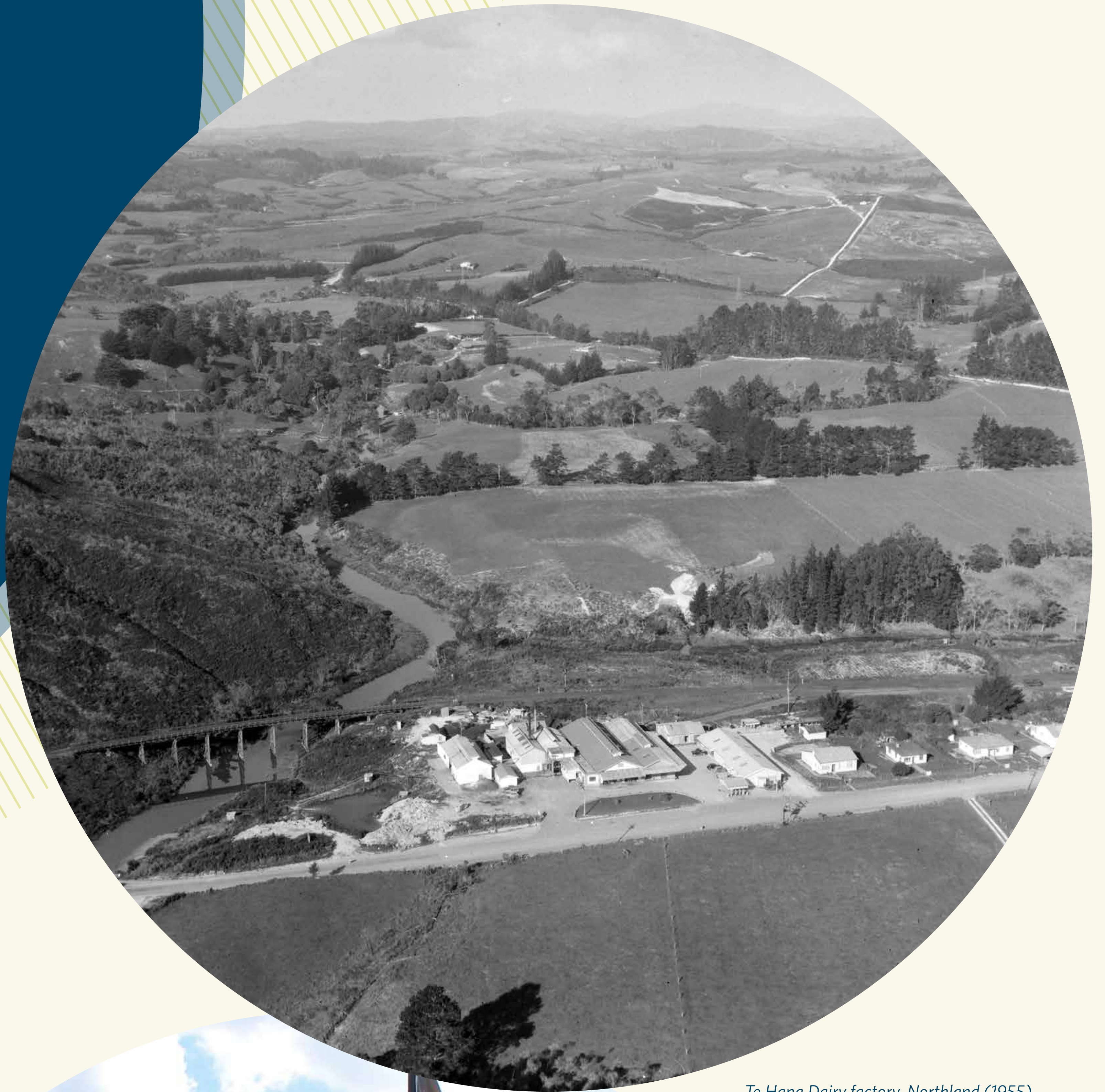


# CULTURE AND HERITAGE

## RESPECTING OUR BUILT AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL HERITAGE:

- The Indicative Alignment avoids many places that help tell the story of our past, including Māori and European historical sites
- There are a number of heritage structures, archaeological sites, and places of cultural significance within the wider project area
- Hōkai Nuku, a collective of mana whenua within the project area, have provided advice during the options assessment phase and continue to help guide our understanding of cultural values in the project area.
- By passing to the east of Te Hana, the Indicative Alignment stays well clear of a cluster of recognised historic sites, including the Te Hana wharf, the original concrete bridge over Te Hana Creek, and the former Albertland Co-Operative Dairy Factory site
- The Indicative Alignment provides opportunities to enhance connections to the cultural and historic environment through sensitive treatment of identified sites and the use of place markers and vantage points.
- Effects on cultural and heritage values will be managed through a range of measures, to be developed and implemented in consultation with mana whenua, Heritage New Zealand, and Auckland Council.
