What is the Western Corridor?

The Western Corridor (SH1) connects the northern and southern Canterbury areas with Christchurch International Airport and runs between Belfast in the north and the large industrial area at Hornby in the south. Most of the traffic on the corridor is heading to and from Hornby, the central city or the airport, with less than 15% of the traffic travelling further to the south.

The focus of this project is to four-lane SH1 from The Groynes to the centre of Hornby and to build a bypass to the west of Belfast. As part of this project a number of intersections along SH1 will need to be redesigned to improve safety and efficiency. The Russley Road (SH1)/Memorial Avenue intersection, as the main access to the airport, needs a design that will function efficiently, well into the future.

Investigations have identified opportunities to improve the local road network to the west of (behind) the airport. These improvements would allow people to bypass the Hornby area if they were coming from or heading further south. However, our surveys indicate that most people will keep using Russley Road to access the airport, Christchurch or Hornby areas, hence the need for the improvements.

Why is the Western Corridor upgrade needed?

Around 37,000 vehicles per day, among the highest for any road in Canterbury, use Main North Road through Belfast to enter and exit Christchurch. This number of vehicles, and in particular the trucks and heavy vehicles using the road, discourage walking and cycling and restrict public transport. As traffic volumes grow, congestion will become worse and safety and public health concerns will increase around the Main North Road/Belfast area.

Further along the corridor, increased commercial and industrial activity, particularly in Hornby and at the airport, is creating more traffic and congestion at peak times. The Canterbury earthquakes have also worsened this situation. There is insufficient capacity in the existing two-lane road to absorb further traffic growth. To ensure businesses based in and outside Christchurch are able to get their goods to and from the airport, the current road requires upgrading to reduce congestion and improve safety.

The benefits

For traffic travelling on SH1 from the north and south, congestion and travel times will be reduced and journeys will have greater travel time certainty.

For the Belfast community, an estimated 17,000 fewer vehicles per day on Main North Road will improve the safety and quality of life for Belfast residents. The decrease in traffic volumes will make walking and cycling much safer and more attractive and provide greater scope for public transport improvements. Improvements to air quality and noise reduction are also expected.

For those travelling between the city and the airport, improvements to the Memorial Avenue/Russley Road intersection will improve safety and reduce delays. The current delays exiting the airport are unacceptable and require a long-term solution.

What will improving the Western Corridor involve?

There are several distinct sections to the upgrading of the Western Corridor. Starting from the north:

- The Western Belfast Bypass is a new four-lane extension of the Northern Motorway bypassing Belfast then joining Johns Road south of the entrance to The Groynes.
- The existing two-lane Johns Road between The Groynes and Harewood Road will be upgraded to a four-lane, median separated road that retains its 80km/h speed limit. The Sawyers Arms roundabout will be upgraded and a new roundabout will be constructed at the Clearwater intersection. For safety reasons, access will be limited to left turns at Wilkinsons, Greywacke and Gardiners roads.
- Russley Road will be a four-lane, median separated road from Harewood Road to Memorial Avenue. The Harewood roundabout will be enlarged and improved. Plans for a cycle subway under the Harewood roundabout are also being investigated. Access at MacLean's Island and Wairakei roads will become left in left out to improve safety. The 80km/h speed limit on Russley Road will be retained.
- The Russley Road (SH1)/Memorial Avenue intersection will be upgraded to cope with the current high traffic volume and increases expected in the future. This upgrade will be a grade separated interchange. (Russley Road will go over Memorial Avenue on a bridge and an intersection at ground level will allow access to Russley Road and Memorial Avenue from every direction.) A range of options have been considered for this intersection but only the interchange will provide a long-term solution. Cycle lanes on Memorial Avenue and pedestrian signals will improve accessibility across Russley Road.
- The existing two-lane section of Russley Road between Memorial Avenue and Yaldhurst Road will be upgraded to a four-lane median separated road. Access to Avonhead Road will be closed due to safety issues and access to and from Ryans Road will be reduced. Additional access to the airport area is being investigated.
- Masham and Carmen roads between Yaldhurst Road and Waterloo Road will become a four-laned, median separated road operating at 50-60km/h. For safety reasons, access will be reduced at some minor intersections.

What stage is the project at?

Each section of the Western Corridor is at a different phase of development.

The Western Belfast Bypass has a detailed design and consenting is underway. Construction will take place between 2013 and 2015.

Johns Road (from The Groynes to Harewood Road) has a confirmed layout, and consent and construction will be carried out between 2012 and 2015.

Construction has begun at the southern end of Russley Road, while planning and consultation will be completed in 2012 for the rest, with consenting and design to follow.

In the Carmen and Masham roads section (between Yaldhurst and Waterloo roads) construction has begun and will be completed in 2014.
