SHARED PATH OPENING

In August 2016 we opened a short section of the new shared path from Williams Park to Kirkbride Road interchange. On Friday 22 June the Associate Minister of Transport, Julie Anne Genter cut the ribbon opening approximately 3km of new shared cycling and pedestrian path alongside SH2OA from the Kirkbride Road interchange to Landing Drive.

The Associate Minister was joined by members of the local community and other guests who took the opportunity to ride the length of the new shared path before enjoying a traditional construction style BBQ breakfast.

The 3km of new shared path makes it easier for people living and working near the airport to get around and will also make it safer for children from the local primary school to cross Kirkbride Road.

Mr T (Teau Aiturau) runs a charity which aims to equip members of the local community, particularly kids, with bikes and bike skills and everything else they need to stay healthy.


The bikes will go to local women keen to learn to ride.
