

State Highway 20A to Airport Improvements

PROJECT UPDATE September 2017

OFFICIAL OPENING

The Prime Minister Bill English and Minister of Transport Simon Bridges officially opened the \$160m Kirkbride Road interchange and underpass with a ribbon cutting on the morning of Friday 18 August.

About 150 people attended the official opening ceremony, including a group of 20 students from Mangere Central School to support David Wilson who spoke on behalf of mana whenua. The new interchange and underpass will improve safety and journey times through this busy intersection. It will also support future population and business growth and improve the movement of freight around Auckland.

As well as the economic benefits, the improvements will have a significant impact on the local community, which was previously divided by the state highway. The Kirkbride Road bridge will reconnect the Mangere community and enable cyclists and pedestrians to cross the highway safely.

Facts about the underpass

- » 100,000 cubic metres of dirt was excavated to form the underpass.
- » 460 tonnes of temporary steel was used to support the underpass excavation. Each temporary steel prop can hold up to 700 tonnes - that's equivalent to the weight of 3 jumbo jets.
- » 1583 truckloads of concrete was required for the underpass base slabs.
- » 360 screw piles, up to 40 metres long, were installed to anchor the underpass in the waterlogged soil.

SH20A/MONTGOMERIE ROAD INTERSECTION

The SH2OA/Montgomerie Road intersection closed permanently on Tuesday 29 August to separate local traffic from motorway traffic, improving the safety of motorists and journey reliability.

Montgomerie Road will become a cul-de-sac and construction will start on a stormwater wetland and footpaths this month. The construction programme will also extend the Kirkbride cycleway, which was opened in August 2016.

The wetland is expected to be completed in January 2018 and the footpaths and cycleway will open in winter 2018.



LIGHTBOX PANELS

The stunning artwork panels displayed at both ends of the Kirkbride Road vehicle underpass were designed by local iwi artists as a gateway to welcome people to Auckland.


The artwork depicts the Maori creation story of the transition from dark to light and symbolises the attainment of knowledge, Te Po (the night) turns into Te Whaiao (dawn) before emerging as Te ao Marama (the light).

The underpass entrance and exit show a pare (door lintel) of a traditional whare tupuna (ancestral meeting house).

These features acknowledge the mana whenua of Tamaki Makaurau (Auckland) and signify kaitiakitanga (guardianship).

Images shown through the lightbox are key elements of a pare: takarangi spirals represent creation; manaia (mythical creatures) figures at the outer edges represent ira atua (immortal life) and ira tangata (human life); the koruru (carved face) is Ranginui (sky father); and the light represents Te Whaiao.

The panels can be lit in any colour. Blue is most often used as it stands out best during the day.

LANDING DRIVE UPGRADE - MAJOR MILESTONES

Landing Drive roundabout will be widened to an 8-lane intersection due to be completed in mid-2018. Major milestones include:

- » Early October 2017 opening the southbound left-turn slip lane into Verissimo Drive.
- » Late November 2017 removing roundabout and install temporary barriers.
- » Mid-February 2018 installing permanent traffic lights and open the intersection.
- » Late March to late April 2018 final surfacing and line marking.

FAREWELL TO THE JUNIOR ALLIANCE MANAGEMENT TEAM

As one of the project's closest neighbours, the project team worked closely with Mangere Central School to ensure they had a positive experience and benefitted from the construction taking place nearby.

A student project team was created to mirror the project management team onsite. Each student took a different role, ranging from project or environmental manager to traffic engineer. The student project team regularly visited the site and completed a series of role-specific tasks linked to the project's construction programme. The students kept their peers and school community up-to-date on the project throughout construction.

The students' contribution was invaluable. They were the conduit between the project team and the school community, enabling families to be kept in the loop about the works programme. Having students take an active part in the construction of SH20A to Airport also shared information about the project with the wider Mangere community.

Throughout their time on the Junior AMT, students have boosted their confidence and built their knowledge. Their last role with the project involved performing the waiata Tutira Mai and the school haka at the official opening event.

And now, it is time for the project to say goodbye and good luck - poroporoaki me te waimarie pai - tofa ma le manuia - zàijiàn, zhù nĭ hǎo yùn. We wish the students of Mangere Central School all the best for their future endeavours and perhaps some of them will become engineers or surveyors on our construction projects in years to come.
