It should also be noted that the sign references in this manual relate to signs described in MOTSAM PART I and are totally unrelated to those given in the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004.

TERMINOLOGY USED IN THE MANUAL

INTERPRETATION:

In this manual the words 'shall', 'must', 'should' and 'may' have the following meanings:

SHALL or MUST Indicates that the statement is mandatory, ie. it is defined by

legislation or NZTA policy, eg. Hazard Markings.

SHOULD - Indicates that the statement is a recommendation, ie. it is non-

mandatory, and that it is good practice which is supported by

relevant guidelines and current practice.

MAY - Indicates an opt ion t hat is non-m andatory and has no

recommendation but is considered good practice which can be varied in differing sit uations or by local road cont rolling

authority practice.

ROAD TYPE:

URBAN ROAD A road with a posted speed limit of 70 km/h or less.

RURAL ROAD A road with a posted speed limit greater than 70 km/h.

URBAN STATE HIGHWAY A designat ed st ate highway with a posted speed limit of

70 km/h or less.

RURAL STATE HIGHWAY - A designated state highway with a posted speed limit greater

than 70 km/h.

GENERAL:

FINE TEXTURED SURFACE - A smooth road surface such as concrete, slurry seal, asphaltic

concrete or friction coarse.

COARSE TEXTURED SURFACE - A rough road surface such as chip seal.

FLUSH - With respect to 'flush traffic islands' or 'flush medians', islands

or medians that are marked on the road surface with paint, thermoplastic, adhesive markings or other such materials.

With respect to 'raised traffic islands' or 'raised medians', **RAISED**

islands or medians that are kerbed, grassed or otherwise with

their top surface higher than the adjacent road surface.
