

NZTA transition - we're making progress

- From 1 November 2024, CoPTTM was superseded by the NZGTTM as the preferred guidance for state highways.
- Contracts are changing to the NZGTTM new Capital contracts from 1 November. Maintenance contracts will convert with the Integrated Delivery Model from 2025.
- 4 x regional pilots with our contractors continue key lessons will be shared with the sector from early-2025.
- Training qualifications based on the Code of Practice to TTM have been phased out to pave the way for a new national training and competency framework.
- We've started quarterly TTM performance reporting will help with further improvements to safety, efficiency and effectiveness.
- Our busy summer maintenance season is an opportunity to fix issues frustrating customers - eg confusing TTM layouts, leftover TTM not being removed fast enough.



Examples - improving TTM efficiency and effectiveness


Careful planning, safe detours, road closures, nightworks, maximising TTM resource is improving productivity.

State highways – pilot vehicles, short and overnight road closures:

- Pavement repairs on state highways in Tairāwhiti used the risk-based approach – less cones, instead pilot vehicles managed road users through worksites.
- 3-week closure of Wellington's SH1 Urban Motorway (WTA) saved \$154,000 on traffic management.

Local, low-volume roads – less cones and 'stop/go':

- Carterton District Council closed roads temporarily.
- Downer NZ team 'working in the gaps' in North Canterbury to do line marking.
- Working with Auckland Transport, Wellington City Council and Christchurch City Council on their transitions.
- Working with the Events Association of NZ to develop guidance for local road closures for local community events.



Examples - improving TTM efficiency and effectiveness

Better upfront planning and smarter applications of control equipment to manage risk are leading to right-sized TTM and creating efficiencies in total works costs.

Devil's Elbow SH2:

 Priority control signs instead of portable traffic lights has reduced costs by \$24k per month – estimated \$216k cost saving over the 9 months.

Matarika Valley SH35:

 \$152k cost saving by including two projects in 1 contract – 1 TTM site for 2 pieces of work.

Otoko Hill SH2:

 \$4k cost saving per month, total \$29k cost saving to the project – using guard rail instead of portable traffic lights is significantly improving safety.

Mangahauini Gorge SH35:

\$18k cost saving using guard rail instead of plastic barriers.








2024 ISG and CCNZ TTM Roadshows



TTM-ISG support for the sector



- Communication: continue regular engagement and updates for sector through e-newsletters, online resources, webinars and in-person events
- Partnering: Strengthening partnership with NZTA and the Road Efficiency Group
- Councils: Expanding engagement across ALL levels in councils
- Assurance: Develop assurance guidance for sector consideration
- Commercial: Share common commercial principles and learnings
- Training: Continuing progress for establishment of Credentials Framework
- Good Practice: Develop and kick-start framework to help the sector identify, evaluate and share good practice
- Advocacy: Advocate on behalf of sector to central/local government and public to improve perceived value of TTM
